

#### Legislative Update

## The Budget Deadline Has Passed. What Are Lawmakers Doing?

eptember 30 marked the last day Congress had to pass the appropriations bills federal agencies will need to operate properly. Failure to do so would result in a government shutdown. At the last possible minute, the House passed a 45-day continuing resolution (CR) which was quickly passed by the Senate and signed by President Biden. The CR keeps the government funded through mid-November.

The passing of a CR to keep the lights on and the doors open is a step forward but it is still a failure of governance by our lawmakers. Constituents should not need to plead with their elected officials to do their job and pass timely appropriations. Service members, veterans, their families, and survivors need and deserve better.

Of the 12 appropriations bills needed to fund the government, only one had passed a single chamber of Congress as of September 13th – the House version of appropriations for military construction and the VA, which passed in July. While the lack of progress for appropriations is disheartening, MOAA will remain focused on service members and their families.

"When our nation's elected leaders fail in these core responsibilities, it sends a negative message to those in uniform, to veteran and family influencers, as well as directly to those who may consider joining," said Lt. Gen. Brian T. Kelly, USAF (Ret), president and CEO of MOAA. "These are bad messages anytime, but are particularly impactful during our current recruiting crisis. We don't need our elected leaders perpetuating and adding to negative perceptions that ultimately dissuade service and threaten our nation's security."

#### What's Next

Until Congress passes the necessary appropriations bills, federal agencies overseeing the uniformed services and veteran communities will lack the funding and authorities needed to maintain an all-volunteer force. Along with the military construction-VA funding mentioned above, MOAA continues tracking the defense appropriations bill, which sets the DoD budget. That legislation was marked up by the House and Senate on June 14th and June 22nd, respectively.

While Congress works on appropriations bills, lawmakers also are pushing forward with authorization legislation. The National Defense Authorization Bill (NDAA) is the most critical of these authorization bills for MOAA's purposes, as it affects DoD policies and programs. Both the House and the Senate have passed their respective versions of the NDAA; the next step in the process is for Congress to sort out the differences in the two bills via conference committee.

Timely appropriations have been an ongoing struggle in Congress. For more than a quarter-century, the federal government has failed to enact the necessary legislative measures to properly fund itself before the September 30 deadline. <u>Tell your</u> lawmakers it's time to act.

# AZMOAA AND AMERICA LOSE A HERO: CAPTAIN ARCHIE Kelley

n September 11, 2023 our AZMOAA Chapter lost its oldest member, and America lost one of its surviving heroes of World War II. At the age of 105, Captain Archie Kelley, USN Retired, is now reunited with the hundreds of shipmates he saved during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, long after they had passed.

Many of our members know his story, but for our newer members who may not, here is why he was so special to us...and to America. Archie was born in Washington, D.C. on July 31, 1918 and graduated from the US Naval Academy in 1941. His first assignment was the *USS West Virginia* in Pearl Harbor. On December 7th, Ensign Kelley was getting dressed to assume his watch as Officer of the Deck when the Japanese attack began.

Archie reported to his duty post, and while bombs and torpedoes were already exploding around the shipyard, he gave the orders to man battle stations and to close all watertight doors and hatches. This action undoubtedly saved the lives of hundreds of sailors as the ship was hit by seven torpedoes shortly thereafter. He then quickly ordered counterflooding on the opposite side of the ship to stabilize it. The USS Oklahoma, which was moored beside the West Virginia, quickly capsized after being hit by several torpedoes, killing 429 Sailors. The Commanding Officer of the West Virginia had been killed, and the Executive Officer and many others had abandoned ship and swam ashore to Ford Island. After a harried escape from a water-filling bottom-deck of the ship, Archie and about 40 others made their way topside, and were eventually evacuated to Ford Island, but not before preventing the same fate as the Oklahoma.

After Pearl Harbor, Archie went on the serve as a Gunnery Officer on three destroyers, supporting Marine landings throughout the Pacific. After the war, Archie attended Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and then worked in the Navy's

nuclear program developing the *Nautilus* and *Seawolf*, the Navy's first two nuclear submarines. One of the men who reported to Archie was a young Naval Officer named Jimmy Carter, who went on to become the 39th President of the United States.

After his long military service, Archie and his wife Carol settled in Paradise Valley, where among other things, he developed his fascination with helicopters. He worked for about 10 years with a company called Kellair, and rented his helicopters to the FAA Sky Harbor for their students' use.

Archie was a frequent speaker with AZMOAA over the years. In 2018 he celebrated his 100th birthday at Sagewood and was honored with a visit by Governor Doug Ducey.

## Final COLA Prediction: Where the 2024 Increase Could Land

ith just a few weeks before final calculations can be made, the annual cost-of-living allowance (COLA) for military retirees, VA disability recipients, Social Security beneficiaries, and others receiving certain federal payments for 2024 is settling in at a higher-than-expected figure, but well below last year's adjustment.

MOAA predicts the upcoming COLA will be 3.2%, down 5.5 percentage points from last year's 8.7% increase. It's the smallest figure in three years, but it's just the fifth time in 20 years the adjustment has reached 3% or higher.

#### The Math

The COLA figure stems from the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W), an inflation-tracking metric updated monthly by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. CPI-W figures from July, August, and September are averaged, and the percentage increase of that number over the previous year's average results (known as the "base") is the new COLA rate.

The average of this year's July and August figures (300.725) would yield a 3.0% COLA increase when compared with last year's base (291.901). If the September figures continue the average rate of increase seen since May, the final figure will result in the 3.2% projection. A second higher-than-expected bump in CPI-W could move that figure up, but likely only by a tenth of a percentage point.

MOAA will update its <u>COLA Watch page</u> on October 12th, after the release of the September figures (likely mid-morning), to reflect the 2024 calculations.

#### MOAA's Role

The cold calculations make the process of an inflation adjustment for military retiree pay seem automatic and predictable. Unfortunately, that hasn't always been the case for this extremely important benefit.

From proposals in the 1980s to eliminate the military retiree COLA entirely to a 2010 commission's report suggesting a deferral of all

military retiree COLA until age 62, the adjustment regularly comes under scrutiny on Capitol Hill. The most recent major threat came in 2013, when a continuing resolution included language creating "COLA minus 1 percent" for retirees under 62 – a reduction to the military retirement benefit that would've cost younger retirees tens of thousands of dollars in earned benefits.

MOAA rallied alongside our partners in The Military Coalition at the time to secure a change to the law in early 2014, before the change could take effect.

More recent threats have come not by targeting military retirement pay, but by plans to change how the overall COLA is calculated. A Congressional Budget Office (CBO) proposal to move from CPI-W to a metric called "Chained CPI" would save the government more than \$250 billion over 10 years, per the CBO's math – with some of that money removed from the pockets of military retirees counting on their earned retirement income.

This proposal has yet to take form in legislation. But as budget battles boil over on Capitol Hill and lawmakers look for cost-cutting solutions amid shutdown threats, MOAA stands ready to make your voice heard and protect all earned benefits, including the value of military retirement pay, from potential cuts.


